### Commission on Aging Report: July 19, 2021

As I sat to write this month's report for COA at the forefront is that I am still working on wrapping my head around the Wiedemanns moving to a neighboring town. From the moment I meet Anna Wiedemann in my interview process it was clear that she has a tremendous impact on this community and an unwavering commitment to Newtown and our seniors. Today, at Anna's last meeting as Chair I'd like to thank her for all she has done for Newtown and who she has been to me. Please mark your calendars for September 1<sup>st</sup> at 3:00 p.m. for a reception at the Senior Center to thank the Wiedemanns for all they have given to our community. It will be a true celebration!

In July we brought back more in-person programming at the Senior Center and we continue to increase our numbers for classes and events. We are also continuing to offer classes and events virtually so members can participate in the venue that they are most comfortable. I have attached a report from My Senior Center detailing participation in in-person programming and current membership, as we have started a new membership year. We continue momentum to bring our lunch program back, with a new meal provider, Whitsons. I hope to have MOUs in place and the program up and running for August.

I have also included information from the *2021 Connecticut Healthy Aging Data Report*. This report is the first of its kind for CT and will be used as a resource for shaping policy and improving programs and services for seniors. The research and analysis was completed by UMass Boston Gerontology Institute and funded by Tufts Health Plan Foundation. The report includes a community profile for every town and city in the state. Newtown's profile is included with my report. The full report can be found at <https://healthyagingdatareports.org/connecticut-healthy-aging-data-report>. I will also bring the hard copy of the report highlights that was published for the members of COA to look through at our meeting.

Energy assistance season is about to kick-off. Newtown Human Services will begin processing applications for energy assistance for this year on September 1<sup>st</sup>. Just a reminder that Renters Rebate applications for this year are still open. Seniors renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. Applications will be accepted through October 1<sup>st</sup>. For more information about the energy assistance application or the Renters Rebate program residents can contact Human Services at 203-270-4330.

This Saturday please keep your eyes out for the Salvation Army kettle bell ringers for *Christmas in July*. 90% of all money brought in stays in Newtown to be accessed by Human Services from the Salvation Army to meet the needs of some of our most vulnerable residents. Please consider joining the forces of ringers!

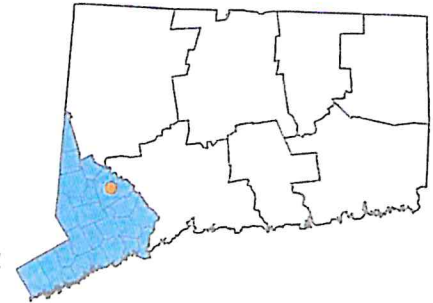

## Newtown (Fairfield)

Newtown is a town in Fairfield County with 4,464 residents age 65 or older. Compared to state average rates, older residents fared better on some healthy aging indicators with lower rates of Alzheimer's disease or related dementias, atrial fibrillation, CHF, diabetes, heart attack, substance and tobacco use disorders, schizophrenia and other psychotic disorders. However, they had higher rates of obesity, asthma, fibromyalgia/chronic pain/fatigue, peripheral vascular disease, prostate cancer, and visual impairment. They are more likely to take the health promotion steps of doing physical activity within last month and not smoke. Community resources to support healthy aging include 13 primary care providers and a nursing home within 5 miles, 20 home health agencies, 9 hospice agencies, 2 caregiver support groups, an assisted living site, a senior center, and a public library. Newtown has been designated an Age-Friendly community.

### TECHNICAL NOTES

\*See our technical report (online at <https://healthyagingdatareports.org>) for more information on data sources, measures, geographic units, margins of error, and statistical methodology. For most indicators the community and state values are estimates derived from sample data. Thus, it is possible that some of the differences between state and community estimates may be due to chance associated with population sampling. We use the terms "Better" and "Worse" to highlight differences between community and state estimates that we are confident are not due to chance. "Better" is used where a higher/lower value has positive implications for the health of older residents. "Worse" is used where a higher/lower score has negative implications for the health of older people, and when the implication is unclear, we use an \*.

We balance two goals. First, we aim to report data at very local levels because we believe change is often locally driven. Second, we vowed to protect the privacy of the people providing the information reported. Thus, given the constraints of the data analyzed we used a hierarchical approach to reporting.

- Population Characteristics: The U.S. Census Bureau (American Community Survey 2014-2018), The Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (2012-2018), Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (2020), The CMS Master Beneficiary Summary File ABCD/Other (2016-2017).
- Wellness, Falls, Prevention, Nutrition/Diet, Oral Health: BRFSS (2012-2018), CMS (2016-2017), the USDA Food Atlas (2017), CT Dept. of Public Health (DPH) (2020).
