Chair Report: A. Rothstein explained that there are ARRP grant opportunities coming and wants to start discussing and planning ahead of time. This year they are doing a community challenge (Attachment A). In 2024 the Dreyfus Foundation will be offering grants and they focus on seniors and people with disabilities (Attachment B). A. Rothstein would also like to negotiate better group discounts for tickets to Gypse, Summer Stock and Dream Girls at the Goodspeed Opera House (Attachment C). She also wants to make sure the seats are where seniors can get to easily, not a lot of stairs.

Applications must be submitted through aarp.org/communitychallenge and are due by March 15, 2023, 5:00 p.m. ET. All projects must be completed by November 20, 2022

AARP LIVABLE COMMUNITIES

AARP Livable Communities supports the efforts of neighborhoods, towns, cities and counties nationwide to become more livable for all. We believe that communities should provide safe, walkable streets; affordable and accessible housing and transportation options; access to needed services; and opportunities for residents, especially those age 50 and older, to participate in civic and community life.

AARP has offices in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands, and is working with local leaders in the more than 700 communities that are part of the [AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities](#). Our vision is for a future in which all communities—urban, suburban and rural—are great for people of all ages.

AARP COMMUNITY CHALLENGE

It takes time to build great communities, but quick actions and tangible improvements can help spark long-term progress. To support this, in 2017 AARP launched the AARP Community Challenge to fund projects that build momentum for change.

Since then, the AARP Community Challenge has awarded \$12.7 million through more than 1,060 grants that have demonstrated the ability to:

- Improve communities with **tangible changes**
- Leverage **additional funds** and support from public, private and philanthropic funders

- Advance change and **overcome policy barriers**
- Lead to new relationships and greater **awareness and engagement** with the effort

AARP is currently soliciting applications for 2023 funding. Applications are due by March 15, 2023, 5:00 p.m. ET, and all projects must be completed by November 30, 2023.

Applications must be submitted through aarp.org/communitychallenge. See Attachment A for the sample application.

GRANT OPPORTUNITY AREAS

In 2023, the AARP Community Challenge is accepting applications across three different grant opportunities, two of which are new this year:

➤ **Flagship Grants**

AARP's flagship Community Challenge grant program where grants have ranged from *several hundred* dollars for smaller, short-term activities to *tens of thousands* of dollars for larger projects. Since 2017, AARP has funded projects ranging from \$500 to \$50,000 with an average grant amount of \$11,900 (83% of grants have been under \$20,000.) AARP also reserves the right to award compelling projects of any dollar amount. We are accepting applications for projects that benefit residents (especially those age 50 and older) in the following categories:

- Creating vibrant **public places** that improve open spaces, parks and access to other amenities;
- Delivering a range of **transportation** and mobility options that increase connectivity, walkability, bikeability and access to public and private transit;
- Supporting a range of **housing** options that increases the availability of accessible and affordable choices;
- Ensuring a focus on **diversity, equity and inclusion** while improving the built and social environment of a community;
- Increasing **digital connections** by expanding high-speed internet and enhancing digital literacy skills of residents;
- Supporting **community resilience** through investments that improve disaster management, preparedness and mitigation for residents;
- Increasing **civic engagement** with innovative and tangible projects that bring residents and local leaders together to address challenges and facilitate a greater sense of inclusion; and
- Improving **community health and economic empowerment** to support residents' financial well-being and improve health outcomes.

➤ **NEW in 2023! Capacity-Building Microgrants**

Combining \$2,500 grants with additional resources, *such as webinars, cohort learning opportunities, up to two hours of one-on-one coaching with leading national organizations and AARP publications*, this new grant opportunity will accept applications for projects that benefit residents (especially those age 50 and older) in the following categories:

- **Walkability** – Implement walk audit assessments to enhance safety and walkability with support from [America Walks](#), using the [AARP Walk Audit Tool](#) it.
- **Community Gardens** – Start or grow a community garden with support from [880 Cities](#), using the AARP publication [Creating Community Gardens for All Ages](#).

➤ **NEW in 2023! Demonstration Grants**

Supporting demonstration efforts that encourage replication of promising local efforts, this new grant opportunity will accept applications for projects that benefit residents (especially those age 50 and older) in the following categories:

- Advancing solutions that build capacity towards **transportation systems changes** (approximately \$30,000 – \$50,000 each). This grant category is sponsored by Toyota Motor North America.
- Implementing **accessory dwelling unit (ADU) design competitions** that increase community understanding of the benefits of accessory dwelling units and encourage implementation of ADU policies (approximately \$10,000 – \$15,000 each).

See **Attachment C** for examples from previous AARP Community Challenge funded projects.

Organizations are eligible to apply for more than one grant opportunity and may submit multiple applications.

ELIGIBILITY

Each project must satisfy the guidelines as described in the **GRANT OPPORTUNITY** section above and the following Organization Type, Mission Focus and Project Type criteria to be eligible:

- **ORGANIZATION TYPE:** The program is open to the following types of organizations:
 - **501(c)(3), 501(c)(4) and 501(c)(6) nonprofits** (*Nonprofit organizations must be recognized by the IRS to receive funds.*)
 - **Government entities**
 - **Other types** of organizations considered on a case-by-case basis. (*Funds will not be provided to any for-profit company, nor individuals. However, AARP does allow for IRS recognized 501(c)(3), 501(c)(4) and 501(c)(6) tax-exempt nonprofit organizations or government entities to serve as fiscal sponsors of grants.*)
- **MISSION FOCUS:** AARP will evaluate each project based on its consistency with the AARP mission to serve the needs of people 50-plus.
- **PROJECT TYPE:** AARP Community Challenge grants may be used to support three project types. Project types described below will be prioritized over those that support ongoing programming or events.
 - **Permanent physical improvements** in the community
 - **Temporary demonstrations** that lead to long-term change
 - **New, innovative programming** pilots or services

PROJECTS THAT ARE INELIGIBLE

The following projects are NOT eligible for funding:

- Partisan, political or election-related activities
- Planning activities and assessments and surveys of communities without tangible engagement
- Studies with no follow-up action
- Publication of books or reports
- Acquisition of land and/or buildings
- Purchase of a vehicle (such as a car or truck)
- Sponsorships of other organizations' events or activities
- Research and development for a nonprofit endeavor
- Research and development for a for-profit endeavor
- The promotion of a for-profit entity and/or its products and services

SCORING

Eligible projects will be assessed on:

- **IMPACT (60 points)** – The project addresses a clear need that brings positive change and demonstrates the ability to overcome barriers and accelerate, grow and/or sustain the community's efforts to become more livable for residents (especially those age 50 and older), focuses on diversity and inclusion, and addresses disparities.
- **EXECUTION (30 points)** – Applicants demonstrate capacity to deliver the AARP Community Challenge project on time and within the awarded budget, effectively engage residents and key stakeholders, and leverage volunteers (especially those age 50 and older) in the execution.
- **INNOVATION (10 points)** – The project demonstrates creativity or unique design or engagement elements which will contribute to its impact on residents (especially those age 50 and older)

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

- Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements.
- Applications must be submitted through [AARP.org/CommunityChallenge](https://www.aarp.org/CommunityChallenge) with all pertinent information by March 15, 2023, 5:00 p.m. ET.
- Incomplete applications will not be reviewed.

GRANT SELECTION

Grant recipients will be selected by an AARP panel of experts on aging, community development and livable communities. Projects will be judged on the degree to which their goals make an immediate change that leads to longer-term impact and meet all other selection criteria.

GRANT SELECTION NOTIFICATION

Grant recipients and unselected applicants will be notified by email in May 2023. Selected applicants must execute and email a binding Memorandum of Understanding and completed vendor forms to AARP by June 14, 2023. Noncompliance with this deadline may result in disqualification or delayed funding.

ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

An Opportunity for Other Possible AARP Funding:

By submitting a proposal for the AARP Community Challenge initiative, you and your organization give AARP permission to reach out to you and others at your organization about other possible AARP funding opportunities that your proposal may be eligible for based on the AARP Community Challenge criteria. However, please note that AARP is not obligated in any way to consider your proposal for any additional AARP funding.

Note Regarding Other Potential Funders:

AARP might be contacted by other potential funders that could be interested in funding projects that were not funded through the AARP Community Challenge. The potential funders may have additional process steps and funding requirements than those of the AARP Community Challenge. If requested, AARP would like to send your contact information, organization name and a short description of the proposal, including the community where the project would take place ("Project Information"). Please note that these projects will be subject to any potential funder's own terms, conditions and review. Please indicate in your application whether or not you give permission to AARP to share your Project Information with other potential funders. We will alert you before this Project Information is given to potential funders.

SUBMISSION TERMS AND CONDITIONS

If you submit this application, you agree on behalf of yourself and your organization to release AARP and its affiliates and their respective officers, directors, employees, contractors, agents and representatives from all liability associated with submission and evaluation of your organization's application.

By submitting an application to AARP, the applicant agrees that:

- The decisions of AARP regarding the eligibility of applicants and the validity of entries shall be final and binding.
- All submissions will be judged by AARP, whose decisions and determinations as to the administration of the award and selection of award recipients are final.

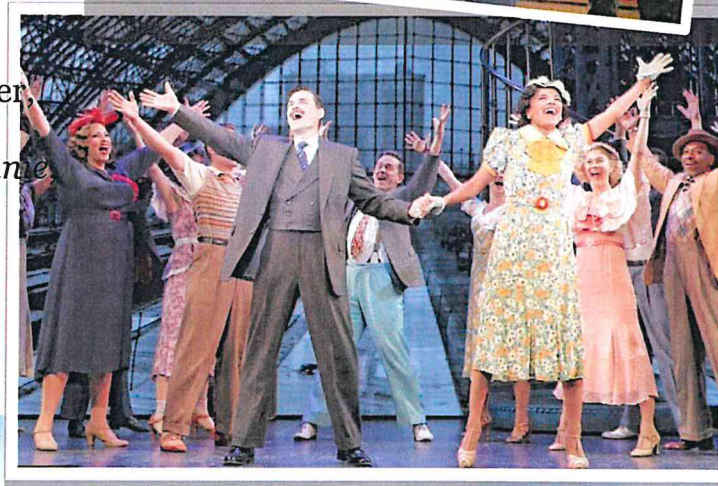

Commission on Aging Report: May 22, 2023

Hello Members of the Commission on Aging,

As I shared last month the Newtown Senior Center moved to online registrations for our classes and all events beginning May 1st. The transition has gone smoothly with the majority of feedback being very positive. Members are appreciating being able to sign up at their convenience- not having to come into the Center to fill out a paper registration form or call the front desk. The system is easy to navigate and allows members to have control over their calendar. They can not only register for their events and classes but they can cancel if needed and see a list of all their registered events on their calendar. With increasing membership and programming this is streamlining the registration process. Staff is continuing to help members at the front desk while at the Center and by phone for reservations.

After researching senior centers in our surrounding area and across CT and much consideration we are moving ahead with changes to the fee schedule for our Health & Wellness classes in the coming FY. For 23/24 no changes to the \$20 resident, \$25 nonresident annual membership fee will be made. Classes for Newtown residents will have no charge and there will now be a fee of \$4.00 per class for out of town members. Speaker presentations, Lunch and Learns, and all other programming (except for Special Events and the congregate meal program) will continue to be included in the membership fee for both residents and non-residents. We are moving to a "no cash" system so as of July 1. Payments will be able to be made through *My Active Center* or by check at the front desk. Including a fee as the majority of area centers do will allow us to add several more classes and increase instructor rates, while freeing more funds to increase the diversity of programming and events throughout the Center.

As we head to the end of the current membership year I am excited to report our current Senior Center membership numbers:

Newtown Resident Members: 623

Non-resident Members: 128

Total Members: 751

On July 20th we will be hosting a Senior Health Fair and Open House at the Senior Center, in partnership with the Health District. We are optimistic that our numbers will continue to grow with the start of a new membership year & promotion around exciting events like the Health Fair/Open House.

This past Friday the Senior Center and Parks & Recreation returned to Newtown High School for the Senior Spring Fling. It was a great success—well attended, with a delicious dinner by NHS Culinary Program, and a packed dance floor thanks to our very own Senior Center dance instructor, Matt Ames, who was the DJ for the event!
