### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING COUNCIL CHAMBERS, 3 PRIMROSE STREET, NEWTOWN, CT OCTOBER 2, 2019

#### **MINUTES**

**PRESENT:** Chris Eide, Chris Smith, Jordana Bloom, Ryan Knapp, Dan Wiedemann, Paul Lundquist, Phil Carroll, Kelley Johnson, Jay Mattegat, Dan Honan.

ABSENT: Robert Pickard, Judit DeStefano.

**ALSO PRESENT:** First Selectman Dan Rosenthal, Finance Director Bob Tait, Public Works Director Fred Hurley, 4 public, 1 press.

**CALL TO ORDER:** Mr. Lundquist called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:30 pm.

**VOTER COMMENT:** None.

MINUTES: MR. WIEDEMANN MOVED TO ACCEPT THE MINUTES OF THE SEPTEMBER 4, 2019 LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING. SECOND BY MR. HONAN. ALL IN FAVOR. MOTION PASSES. (9-0) Mr. Smith abstained.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** Mr. Lundquist shared an invitation for Legislative Council members to tour the Garner Correctional Institution on October 8, 2019. One email was received regarding the plastic bag ordinance. (ATTACHED)

**COMMITTEE REPORTS:** None. Mr. Lundquist said committee may meet after the CIP policy is received.

#### FIRST SELECTMAN'S REPORT

Fairfield Hills Community Sessions: First Selectman Rosenthal said the Board of Selectmen held the first community session, about 100 people attended, limiting questions for each respective sessions, next one will be November 18. Mr. Wiedemann suggested identifying cost per building. Mr. Lundquist suggested to include opportunities that have been reviewed over the years, will submit online. First Selectman Rosenthal said that questions and ideas can be sent to FY@newtown-ct.gov.

FEMA: First Selectman Rosenthal said the federal government signed off last week, a press release said Newtown was awarded \$2,045,000. The state needs to sign off, reimbursed through the state. Mr. Wiedemann asked if there would be any reason the state would hold up the funds, First Selectman Rosenthal does not believe so. Mr. Knapp asked if the state has parallel claims with FEMA, First Selectman Rosenthal said that is possible and claims were probably submitted. Only a certain number of towns were able to meet requirements for applying.

CIP: First Selectman Rosenthal said that the Board of Selectmen will taking up CIP at next meeting. Does not expect anything new to be reviewed, but will review existing items.

Mr. Tait covered the advance look of some pages of financial statements, unaudited, for fiscal year ending June 30, 2019. (ATTACHED) Mr. Lundquist noted the 11.8% in unassigned fund balance and asked if that included the transfer to BOE non-lapsing. Mr. Tait said, yes, that is included, it is a true number. Mr. Lundquist also noted how the FEMA money will affect fund balance and will be involved with allocation discussion. Mr. Knapp questioned pension, bargaining units,

intergovernmental. Mr. Tait said close to 80% and will provide details at the next meeting. Mr. Eide questioned the collection rate, Mr. Tait said the reserve for fund balance was planned, assumed collection rate was the same. Ms. Johnson noted each Town department came under budget, Mr. Tait replied that is typical, cannot go over budget within the department.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

### **Update on Road Maintenance Activities**

Mr. Hurley updated road maintenance for the year. (ATTACHED) Mr. Hurley said that road work is coming along well so far, able to schedule contractor services, have the bulk of contracted paving completed, now concentrating on in-house work. Additional work can be done in the spring, depending on how much money is available after the winter. Mr. Wiedemann asked about the quality of patch paving and using in-house or outside vendors. Mr. Hurley said issues were rectified and done to satisfaction. Some patch paving may use a local contractor, depends who is available and what the work is. Mr. Wiedemann referred to complaints about chip sealing. First Selectman Rosenthal said that the contractor addressed the chip sealing issues. Mr. Mattegat asked why cones were not placed around the manhole covers on Hanover Road. Mr. Hurley explained that the milling company was supposed to paint, it is the contractor's responsibility and there are approx. 11-12 claims, unsure of dollar amount, they are evaluating claims. Mr. Smith asked about the decision making process over paving new roads and unpaved roads. Mr. Hurley said the emphasis is to get major roads up to focus, noting a long term study done by the University of Minnesota, based on a 20-year life span of a road, can be twice the cost to maintain a dirt road vs. a paved road. Have to maintain the road for emergency vehicles.

Mr. Knapp asked about non-town owned roads, not meet town standards, created to bring into town system, discussed using some town work to get the ownership of the road over to the town. First Selectman Rosenthal said looking into that, some associations don't have the money, Dave Groggins is looking into. Mr. Carroll asked if the problem with delamination was resolved. Mr. Hurley said in some places, build strength can improve the road. Use of a smaller stone. Mr. Wiedemann asked for an update of Exit 11, Mr. Hurley said work has been pushed out another year, looking at 2021 before any major process. First Selectman Rosenthal said he wants to see the homes taken down and is pressing the state. Mr. Lundquist asked about cost savings of smaller stone size. Mr. Hurley said the bulk of the cost is not the material, cost of material is the same.

### **Update on New Police Station**

First Selectman Rosenthal said the bids for the project came in last Wednesday. Expect groundbreaking first or second week of November 2019, with a completion date of November 2020. Communications upgrade, dispatch equipment, and radio equipment for respective departments, planning on upgrading. May need to go through the approval process for public to approve. Mr. Wiedemann cautioned to address construction project responsibility issues early on to avoid future problems, First Selectman Rosenthal said that the Board of Selectmen should be referring every capital project to Public Building & Site, then Public Building & Site can coordinate with departments, there is a small police subcommittee that attends meetings.

The meeting resumed at 8:47 pm.
