The Parks and Recreation Commission held an in-person meeting on Tuesday, June 8, 2021 with an opportunity for phone – in public participation, in the multipurpose room of the Senior Center, 8 Simpson Street, Newtown, CT

Public Participation:

- Mr. Glenn Boyle came to discuss the Tennis Associations tournament coming up in the fall at the end of September/beginning of October. He came to discuss prices and how many courts he would like to use. He also pointed out some maintenance needed at 2 of the Dickinson courts and one of the Treadwell courts. He also thanked Newtown Parks and Recreation for putting up new nets and keeping the courts nice.
- Mr. Stephen Small asked the commission if there could be 2 more pickleball courts put in at the Fairfield Hills Campus due to the growing popularity of it. Mr. Small also asked if the cracks in the current courts could be fixed. Chairman Clinton DePaolo explained to Mr. Small that to put in more courts it would have to be approved and they would have to go through the correct steps. Mr. DePaolo also pointed out that there is pending construction on the Fairfield Hills Campus that may prevent putting in more courts. Ms. Amy Mangold also mentioned that the courts that are there now were supposed to be temporary and she is working towards getting a more permanent location.

 nice addition to the landscape and also requested that gardening tools be made more
 accessible for herself and others.

Ms. Mangold also reported that once Cristal Preszler of the Town of Newtown received word of the project idea, the day of the meeting she informed Ms. Spencer and Ms. Laura that it was not allowed due to Fairfield Hills Adaptive Reuse zoning regulations (Attachment #2). • Mr. Clinton DePaolo didn't have anything to report but did remind the commission that CIP is coming up and that they should start considering any projects that they would like to move forward with.

Directors Report

Amy Mangold, Director of Parks and Recreation

- Ms. Amy Mangold reported that the department opened the pool and beach successfully Memorial Day weekend. They did not have to use a reservation system due to new COVID regulations and is excited to have a full season ahead.
- Ms. Mangold also reported the town IT team has done a lot for the department and they were able to help get all the season time clocks, computers, and door fobs up and running for the summer season. They also recently upgraded their Vermont System registration system.
- Ms. Mangold was very excited to report that Newtown Parks and Recreation was rewarded on of the Department of education's Accelerate CT grants of \$25,000 for enrichment and more inclusion in the summer day camps. In addition, Parks and Recreation will be working with Alana and library staff to include literary programs along with other fun and engaging acceleration programs (*Attachment #3 & #4*).
- Ms. Natalie Jackson has been helping vet scholarships for the program as well.

- Parks and Recreation sponsored the Families United in Newtown Concert this past Sunday, June 6th, at Dickinson Park Band shell that turned out to be a great success. There were many participants that said they hope it is held there again, Ms. Mangold credited Ms. Linda Jones on her amazing job for her fundraiser events.
- The Junior Prom hosted at Dickinson was also a big success, turned out to be a beautiful event and old fashioned.
- Summer concerts are starting this month with the children's series being held on Tuesdays and being sponsored by the library. Thursday night concerts are being sponsored by Claris Construction and Caraluzzi's. We will be having our fans made again like in past years (*Attachments* #5 & #6).
- Last month Ms. Mangold expressed the need to fill the open full time secretary position in the office and was happy to report they will be filling it.
- The skate park enhancements being created with the skaters, the Capozziello Family and American Ramp Company will be ready to be presented at next month's meeting. Ms. Mangold will be reviewing the budget and keeping everyone up to date on the project.
- The Bicycle playground committee will be going to the Fairfield Hills Authority meeting on June 28th to hopefully further the process of created the new and exciting space.



Andrea and Laura,

I have become aware of the interest by the Cultural Arts Commission (below) to do painting of areas of the Fairfield Hills Campus. Please be advised that this is not allowed under the Fairfield Hills Adaptive Reuse zoning regulations, and may NOT move ahead.

It is my understanding that zoning regs for the town also have jurisdiction over murals in any area of the town.

If you wish to discuss this further, please let us know and we can schedule a meeting to discuss.

Andrea received two new proposals for the murals to be created by local artist Lindsay Fuori, one on a fence across from the Senior Center at Fairfield Hills and the other at the dog park. Andrea explained some of the history of this project to the two new Commission members: that Lindsay is a 26-year-old Newtown artist who originally proposed artwork on electrical boxes around town, as many towns have done. It turned out that this was not allowed in Newtown, so she began looking into other possible venues. All members of the Commission received her latest ideas from Andrea via email this week, as did Park & Rec, who is also involved in this project. It was discussed that Fred Hurley needs a head-up about these latest proposals and that Park & Rec liked the second idea for the dog park (different breeds of dogs looking over a fence). Arts Commission members seemed to generally prefer this image over the one of paw prints.

The proposal for the fence across from the Senior Center was to paint an abstract portrait of an original Fairfield Hills building using a bright palette that Lindsey demonstrated to us by sending samples of some of her works done in this fashion. She stated in her proposal that her goal was to "stand document to the quiet beauty of the buildings, be a witness to our town's complex history, and remember the lives lived on the campus in the years before us." The Commission discussed how this would stand up to weather (similarly to Virginia Zimmerman's railroad painting on Church Hill Road, which has done fine). It was mentioned that this needs to be discussed with Matt Ariniello of the Community Center and Natalie Jackson of the Senior Center.



Monthly park update and field report

Sports are in full swing as academic and rec sports are nearing the end of the spring season. We have many playoffs and tournaments coming up in the next month. We will soon be getting the parks ready for day camp as we move towards July.

<u>Dickinson Park:</u> We are in the process of patching a hole in the pavilion roof and continue to cover up graffiti which has become a very frequent issue. We have had a few recent larger events here which went well.

Newtown Middle School: We continue to mow and groom on a regular schedule here.

Orchard Hill: No new news here.

Lake Lillinonah: The buffer garden renovation has been completed.

<u>Oakview</u>: Field fertility and regular mowing continues here. The mulching here has also been completed..

Tilson Field: No news here.

<u>Treadwell Soccer/Softball</u>: We painted the softball field for senior night which traditionally includes large softballs in the outfield with the numbers of graduating seniors.

Glander Fields: We have started the dugout installation as regular mowing and grooming continues.

<u>Liberty Fields</u>: Regular grooming, mowing and painting will continue through the spring sports season.

Walnut Tree: The entrance gate and about 40 linear feet of fencing was destroyed here. Based on the cost of the gate this will be a \$12-14K repair. Regular mowing and grooming continue here.

Fairfield Hills: We set up and broke down for the Rooster Run. Some topsoil and seeding is in progress at the community center as is mulching behind the building as the eves are repaired. Regular mowing and grooming around campus continues. Broken bollards on the walking trail have been replaced and the graffiti on the trail benches was removed. A new memorial bench on the trail was installed as well.

NHS Fields: The fields are cut, groomed and painted for the NHS athletic season. The field are in good shape. We are working with NHS on some minor improvements here.

Sandy Hook School: These fields are open and on the regular grooming, mowing and painting schedule.

<u>Hawley School Fields:</u> These fields are open and on the regular grooming, mowing and painting schedule.

Eichlers Cove Marina: New sand has been added to the beach. We also reestablished the swail to help keep the sand in place when it rains hard. The beds were mulched and pruning was completed prior to Memorial Day weekend. A new swim line was put in along with the lifeguard chairs being installed for the season.

<u>Dog Park:</u> No new news here although we have established a permanent mowing time on Wednesday mornings so the guys can get the park cut without worry of dogs getting hurt.

<u>Treadwell Park:</u> The pools was opened on schedule for Memorial Day weekend with new gutters and many other freshened mechanics. We have set a new light pole for pool security lighting and will be adding the light very soon. The flagpole here was repaired and the volleyball nets have been replaced.

All of the parking lines were repainted here as well.

Pole Bridge Preserve: No new news here

Watertown Field: These fields are open and on the regular grooming, mowing and painting schedule.
