<u>Erica Sullivan moved to approve the minutes from June 23, 2022. Laura Miller seconded.</u> Erica Sullivan noted the correction that Erica *Sullivan* approved the minutes. All in favor and motion passes.

#### First Selectman's Report

The First Selectman reported on the road plan. General paving has increased in square footage with less drainage (~15.5 miles). The State is planning to use rubber chip (instead of chip seal) on 302, This may be a process the Town adopts in the future. Discussion regarding cost and life span occurred.

#### **Finance Director's Report**

Finance Director, Bob Tait, reported on the Fund Balance highlighting agencies receiving Town of Newtown contributions (see attached). These agencies include (but are not limited to) volunteer companies, lake authorities, Newtown Health District and quasi-governmental agencies (NY&FS, CAC, library). These, and other agencies, request contributions from the Town. Mr. Tait reminded the Board financial statements, current year budget with estimated actuals, prior year budget actuals, audited financials and statement on fund balance are all things to be considered when reviewing budget contribution requests. Mr. Tait also spoke about Newtown codes, IRS 990s and audited financial statements. The First Selectman talked about the importance of some measure of fairness across departments doing their due diligence in terms of budgeting. Ms. Miller inquired about the task of the BOF undertaking policies and guidelines. The Board discussed further.

#### **New Business**

ARP and Recycle Committees

Erica Sullivan shared ARP Committee voted to recommend allocation to support student tutoring services related to the loss of learning from Covid in the amount of \$100,000 through the Newtown Human Services Department. The Committee also recommend \$20,000 towards child enrichment funds to supplement other services also through the Newtown Human Services Department. Lastly, the approval of a bucket loader for Public Works occurred.

Laura Miller shared the committee saw the draft of the reconfiguration of the transfer station area at the last meeting. Plans will continue.

#### FROM TOWN OF NEWTOWN CODE:

Chapter 10. Authorities

Article I. Lake Lillinonah Authority

[Adopted by the Board of Selectmen 7-20-1971 (Ord. No. 33)]

§ 10-1. Establishment.

The Town of Newtown, acting in concert with any other town or towns having a portion of Lake Lillinonah within their territorial limits, hereby establishes a lake authority for said lake, to be known as the "Lake Lillinonah Authority."

§ 10-2. Membership; terms of office.

Said Authority shall be composed of three delegates from each member town, who shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen of each town for terms of three years, all of which such terms shall be commenced upon the date when the first such delegate is appointed; except that the initial appointments shall be for terms of one, two and three years, respectively.

§ 10-3. Powers and duties.

The Lake Lillinonah Authority shall exercise all powers granted by the Connecticut General Statutes for lake authorities, including, without limitation, powers relating to the enforcement of boating laws on said lake and such other powers as from time to time may be granted to said Authority by the legislative bodies of all member towns and the General Statutes.

Article II. Lake Zoar Authority

[Adopted 11-9-1972 STM (Ord. No. 37)]

§ 10-4. Establishment; composition; authority.

[Amended 8-22-2007 by Ord. No. 90]

Pursuant to the powers granted by § 7-151a of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended from time to time, the Lake Zoar Authority is hereby established. Said Authority shall be comprised of the Town of Newtown and such other towns having Lake Zoar within their territorial limits as may adopt the provisions of said statute, and shall exercise all powers authorized under the statutes of this state for lake authorities, including, without limitation, the power to act as agent for the member towns in cooperating with the State Boating Commission in the enforcement of the boating laws on Lake Zoar.

§ 10-5. Powers and duties.

Upon approval by the legislative bodies of all member towns, the Lake Zoar Authority shall have the power to:

A.

Control and abate algae and aquatic weeds in cooperation with appropriate state authorities;

[Amended 8-22-2007 by Ord. No. 90]

Study water management, including but not limited to water depth and circulation, and make recommendations for action to member Towns; and

C.

Act as agent for member towns with respect to filing applications for grants and reimbursements with the Department of Environmental Protection and other state agencies in connection with state and federal programs.

§ 10-6. Membership; terms of office.

Said Authority shall be composed of three delegates from each member town, who shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen of each town; one for a term of two years and one for a term of three years. All subsequent appointments shall be for terms of three years.

#### 2005 Connecticut Code - Sec. 7-151a. Establishment of lake authorities. Withdrawal of town.

Sec. 7-151a. Establishment of lake authorities. Withdrawal of town. (a) As used in this section, "state waters" means all waters within the territorial limits of the state except navigable waters of the United States. Any two or more towns which have within their territorial limits a body of state water may establish by ordinance a lake authority. Said authority shall act as agent for the member towns in cooperating with the Commissioner of Environmental Protection in the enforcement of the boating laws on such water.

- (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 7-330, such authority shall be composed of at least three delegates from each member town whose term of office and method of selection shall be determined by the towns establishing the authority provided each member town may appoint up to four delegates to the authority. Each town shall pay to the authority its respective share of the expenses of the commission prorated on the basis of its linear footage of shore line or any other formula agreed on and adopted by a majority of the legislative bodies of all member towns. Any member town may, by ordinance, withdraw from such authority, effective upon the mailing of written notice of such withdrawal to the authority. Each withdrawing town shall be liable for its share of expenses incurred prior to the effective date of such notice. Upon the withdrawal of any town or towns, the authority shall remain in force insofar as the remaining town or towns are concerned, but the jurisdiction of the authority shall be reduced to that portion of said body of state water lying within the boundaries of such remaining town or towns. In the event of such a withdrawal, the portion of such body of state water lying within the town or towns withdrawing from the authority shall revert to the status existing prior to the adoption of the authority.
- (c) In addition to the power granted in subsection (a) a lake authority may be granted by the legislative bodies of its respective towns powers to: (1) Control and abate algae and aquatic weeds in cooperation with the Commissioner of Environmental Protection; (2) study water management including, but not limited to, water depth and circulation and make recommendations for action to its member towns; (3) act as agent for member towns with respect to filing applications for grants and reimbursements with the Department of Environmental Protection and other state agencies in connection with state and federal programs; and (4) to act as agent for member towns with respect to receiving gifts for any of its purposes.
- (d) A lake authority shall have no jurisdiction in any matters subject to regulation by the Commissioner of Environmental Protection.
- (e) Each member town of any lake authority shall protect and save harmless such town's delegates to such lake authority from financial loss and expense, including legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of alleged negligence on the part of such delegate while acting in the discharge of his duties as such delegate. Each such member town may insure against the liability imposed by this subsection in any insurance company organized in this state or in any insurance company of another state authorized to write such insurance in this state or may elect to act as self- insurer of such liability.

On behalf of Regional Hospice, I am writing you to respectfully request \$10,000.00 grant support from the Town of Newtown for your 2021-22 fiscal year budget. We are grateful for your community's support of those in our region living with life-limiting illness. With your partnership, we can provide exceptional end-oflife care and bereavement support to the residents of Newtown.

During the 2020 fiscal year, Regional Hospice served 73 residents from Newtown with 2833 visits.

In addition to the patients we serve, we have 40 Newtown residents who volunteer their time to help Regional Hospice. These devoted volunteers have received intensive training to serve as family support, community bereavement and center volunteers.

The pandemic has had a significant effect on the day-to-day operations of Regional Hospice and the care of our patients because of the increased stress on our devoted clinical teams and the amount of personal protective equipment (PPE) now required when caring for each patient. Since March, we have made changes at our Center for the protection of our patients, visitors, and staff: conducting weekly COVID testing for all staff, installing protective modifications to the lobby and all clinical stations at the Center, as well as implementing necessary modifications for non-clinical staff work-spaces to ensure social distancing protocols. We have spent tens of thousands of dollars on hazard pay to staff who are working directly with COVID positive patients in the community.

My deepest thanks to you and the Town of Newtown for your commitment to our mission of compassionate end-of-life care and comfort to those experiencing the grief of loss. We respectfully request your consideration for the year ahead as we continue to provide exceptional care for Newtown residents in their home and at our center. Dear Mr. Tait:

We would like to request funding from the Town of Newtown to help local Newtown ALICE households next fiscal year. Following is a brief update about our work in the local community supported through your continued funding.

#### How Are Local ALICE Households Fairing?

ALICE households across the nation have been hit especially hard in the pandemic. In a new report just released by United for ALICE, an analysis of national surveys shows that households earning below the ALICE Threshold (basic cost of living) have fared significantly worse than households above the threshold—financially, physically, and emotionally. Even with the added protective measures of eviction moratoria and housing and food assistance programs, conditions worsened for households below the ALICE Threshold from March 2020 to May 2021. ("The Pandemic Divide", Oct 2021). Local ALICE families had already been living paycheck to paycheck before COVID-19 struck. Combined with those in poverty, even before the crisis, 27% of Newtown households had income below the basic cost of living threshold. Our local research shows that when weighing the priorities of paying for food, rent, utility bills, transportation to work, etc., ALICE families who would like to involve their children in team sports and other extra-curricular activities struggle to afford the cost, and often cannot do so.

#### **ALICE Enrichment Fund**

We would like to request \$5,000 next year for out-of-school activity for children of Newtown families through United Way ALICE Enrichment funding. As our communities recover and activities are opening up, now more than ever, children need out-of-school supports to recover from the Covid learning environment. Research shows that children who participate in youth sports (as one example) have improved levels of physical and mental health, and academic achievement. Started in 2017, the ALICE Enrichment Fund offsets the cost of children's activities, up to \$300 per child each year (up to \$900 per family), to ease the burden, allowing Newtown children from low-income families to benefit from team sports, swimming lessons, music, art, and other activities. As of last June (2021), \$15,500 has been distributed to the Newtown Department of Social Services through the ALICE Enrichment Fund serving more than 40 families and more than 60 local children.
