The Board of Selectmen held a regular meeting Monday, November 6, 2017 in the Council Chamber, Newtown Municipal Center, 3 Primrose Street, Newtown. First Selectman Llodra called the meeting to order at 7:30p.m.

PRESENT: First Selectman Llodra, Selectman Herbert C. Rosenthal.

ABSENT: Selectman William F.L. Rodgers

**ALSO PRESENT:** Finance Director Robert Tait, Conservation Commission Vice Chairman Holly Kocet and member Cindy Joyce, Deputy Director for Economic and Community Development Christal Preszler, Fairfield Hills Authority Chairman Ross Carley, Cultural Arts Chairman Laura Lerman and member Rob Kaiser, Town Attorney David Grogins (8:00pm), five members of the public and two members of the press.

VOTER COMMENTS: none.

ACCEPTANCE OF THE MINUTES: Selectman Rosenthal moved to accept the minutes of the 10/16/17 meeting. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** First Selectman Llodra shared the attached communications with Selectman Rosenthal. (att.)

FINANCE DIRECTORS REPORT: Mr. Tait presented a budget update (att.). First Selectman Llodra recommended the Legislative Council initiate a special appropriation request to restore the Board of Education budget for the special education grant (att.). Nothing will be done with the other items cut during the budget process, including pension for both Board of Education and the Board of Selectmen, roads and Board of Education maintenance/repairs until there is a better sense of what the municipality will be facing. Mr. Tait stated the Employee Medical Benefits fund is doing well to date. Selectman Rosenthal didn't agree with the actions, at the time, of the Legislative Council. Voters decide on expenditures; restoring items later does not allow the voters to vote. Selectman Rosenthal agrees with First Selectman Llodra's recommendations to the Legislative Council.

### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

### Discussion and possible action:

- 1. Request from Cultural Arts: Ms. Lerman and Mr. Kaiser were present to discuss options relative to the naming of the art gallery at the Municipal Center. Mr. Kaiser went through several ideas and reported the decision chosen was Municipal Gallery at Fairfield Hills. First Selectman Llodra asked Ms. Lerman and Mr. Kaiser to come back in January with the final design for the signs and to have a public conversation with the newly elected Board of Selectmen about the relationship Cultural Arts has with the Municipal Center.
- 2. Invasive Plant Ban: Ms. Kocet and Ms. Joyce were present to request action on an invasive plant ban (att.). First Selectman Llodra said she had spoken to Land Use and Parks & Recreation and they are in agreement with the list. Selectman Rosenthal moved that the Town of Newtown endorses the ban of all plants on the Connecticut Invasive Plant List on town-owned properties. The List includes both Invasive and Potentially Invasive Plants as determined by the Connecticut Invasive Plants Council in accordance with the Connecticut General Statutes §22a-381a through §22a-381d. As this List is reviewed and revised annually by the CT Invasive Plants Council, any updates will be immediately incorporated into the Town of Newtown's Invasive Plant Ban. All town departments are directed to consult the List before considering any new plantings on townowned land. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

### Discussion and possible action:

- 1. Ten year update on Fairfield Hills (2007-2017): Ms. Preszler and Mr. Carley presented the ten year update on Fairfield Hills (att.). Selectman Rosenthal stated although the bonding was approved in 2001, the purchase was completed in 2004, after environmental remediation. Remediation and demolition numbers do not indicate an intent to demolish, they are listed only as possible future costs. Ms. Preszler continues to work with the state for funding relative to the roof on Stratford Hall. Mr. Hurley is the point person on the Municipal Center roof. The lead paint at Shelton has been loose scraped and sealed. First Selectman Llodra spoke about the brightness of the campus now that there are more lights and suggested a conversation with the Sustainable Energy Commission.
- 2. Retainer Agreement between Town of Newtown and Drubner, Hartley & Hellman, LLC and Simmons Hanly Conroy, LLC: Each town that chooses to partner with Waterbury in action against the manufacturers of prescription opiates has to have their own retainer agreement. There is no cost associated. <u>Selectman Rosenthal moved to authorize the First Selectman to sign the retainer agreement with Simmons, Hanly Conroy, LLC and Drubner, Hartley & Hellman, LLC.</u> First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.
- 3. Transfer: Selectman Rosenthal moved to transfer \$17, 500 from Contingency to Fees & Professional Services as per transfer request dated 10/23/17 (att.). First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.
- 4. Parks & Recreation Contract: Selectman Rosenthal moved the Parks & Recreation contract as presented from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2020. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.
- 5. Newtown Police Contract: Selectman Rosenthal moved to authorize the First Selectman to sign the Police contract as presented from July 1, 2017 June 30, 2020. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.
- 6. Appointments/Reappointments/vacancies/openings: none.
- 7. **Driveway Bond Release/Extension:** Selectman Rosenthal moved the release of a driveway bond for Mastroni Development, 3 Anthony Ridge, M25, B1, L6, in the amount of \$2,000. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.
- 8. Tax Refunds: Selectman Rosenthal moved the November 2017 Tax Refunds, No. 7 in the amount of \$13,690.50 and No. 7A in the amount of \$38.08. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

**ADD TO THE AGENDA:** Selectman Rodgers moved to add to the agenda, for discussion and possible action, the use of 2, 3 and 4 wheel vehicles on public land. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

9. Use of 2, 3 and 4 Wheel Vehicles on Public Land: First Selectman Llodra stated that Newtown Babe Ruth has purchased a utility vehicle to use to transport things across the field and to help with field conditions. The Board of Selectman and the Legislative Council have to approve use of a motorized vehicle on campus. Mr. Marks explained the vehicle would remain under the control of Newtown Babe Ruth Baseball, they are responsible for the maintenance and the training the operators on the safe operation of the vehicle. Operators are designated by the league. Selectman Rosenthal moved to approve the request as specified in document by Mr. Via, President of Newtown Babe Ruth League, dated Oct. 18, 2017 for the use of utility vehicle at Fairfield Hills Baseball field only (att). First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

VOTER COMMENTS: none.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: none.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** Selectman Rosenthal moved to enter executive session for discussion on legal matters relative to Irma Richards v. Town of Newtown and strategy concerning potential claim regarding the owner's rep contract, and invited Town Attorney Grogins to attend. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor. Executive session was entered into at 8:34pm and returned to regular session at 8:44pm with the following motion:

Selectman Rosenthal moved to authorize the Town Attorney to appear on behalf of town to monitor the lawsuit involving Irma Richards v. Town of Newtown. First Selectman Llodra seconded. All in favor.

Subject: LOF Continued Operations at Walnut Tree Hill Field

Dear Selectman Llodra,

It has come to my attention that the town of Newtown has revoked LOF Adaptive Skiers' future lisence to use the public beach area at [town-owned] Walnut Tree Hill Field. I understand this decision was made based on complaints from neighbors, whose justification has since been proven invalid. I respectfully request that this decision is overturned and use of the Walnut Tree Hill Field is once again made available to LOF Adaptive Skiers.

The first time I experienced one of LOF's waterski clinics, I assisted a 9-year-old visually impaired boy as he waterskied for the first time. When he returned to shore he told me that he had found his calling, and I instantly knew that LOF was providing life-changing experiences for the disabled community, which is constantly denied opportunities. Throughout my 4 years of involvement with LOF, I have witnessed countless individuals discover their potential and experience freedom through waterskiing, and this newfound freedom means the entire world to them. I strongly urge you to consider the lisencing issue from their perspective. Currently, there are no alternatives for access to the [public] lake for people with disabilities and therefore nowhere else for LOF to operate from. Revoking LOF's access to the lake exacerbates the disparities which the disabled community experiences far too often. I feel very strongly that LOF participants deserve the opportunity to waterski on Lake Zoar and continue to experience the unparalleled joy that waterskiing provides.

This summer I returned to LOF for several waterski events and witnessed firsthand how the organization operates at the Walnut Tree Hill Field. LOF staff and participants were both extremely grateful to be operating at a fully accessible location for individuals with disabilities and fully considerate of the surrounding neighbors and boaters. Despite complaints from the surrounding community, I did not perceive any inconvenience to them while attending LOF's clinics.

Thank you for your consideration of my viewpoint on this matter. I believe it is a critical issue, and would like that LOF's license for use of Walnut Tree Hill Field be renewed to ensure that adaptive sports remain accessible for people with disabilities. As a proud volunteer and supporter of LOF Adaptive Skiers, this issue is of paramount interest to me.

### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

WHEREAS, THE TOWN OF NEWTOWN STANDS TO LOSE \$3,814,563 IN REVENUE. NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: THAT THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL REDUCE EDUCATION COST SHARING GRANT REVENUE (PAGE 58 OF BOS BUDGET BOOK) BY \$1,500,000. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: THAT THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL REDUCE THE BOARD OF EDUCATION BUDGET LINE ITEM (PAGE 270 OF THE BOS BUDGET BOOK) BY \$1,031,481. THE \$1,031,481 REPRESENTS THE NET AMOUNT OF AN INCREASE IN SPECIAL EDUCATION GRANT OF \$2,408,508 AND THE ELIMINATION OF THE EXCESS COST SPECIAL EDUCATION GRANT OF \$1,377,027. IF THE FINAL ADOPTED STATE BUDGET DOES NOT INCREASE NEWTOWN'S SPECIAL EDUCATION GRANT BY \$1,031,481 THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL WILL MAKE THE BOARD OF EDUCATION WHOLE BY USING ANY RESULTING INCREASE IN THE (LC ADOPTED) ESTIMATED REVENUE - COST SHARING GRANT (ECS) LINE ITEM AND/OR OTHER BUDGETARY MEANS. SECOND BY MR. CHAUDHARY. Ms. Jacob asked Mr. Tait to show page 58 of the Board of Selectmen budget book and reviewed the Revenue Budget Detail and discussed possibilities in response to a reduction. Mr. Knapp said that the impetus of this resolution is the state proposed budget. He explained how revenue is realized, in the form of revenue or in the form of a grant. This resolution is a plan to anticipate both scenarios. Dr. Erardi said that in the worst-case scenario the Board of Ed stays flush. Ms. DeStefano said this is over and above cuts from the education sub-committee. Ms. DeStefano would have liked to see this resolution ahead of time, advance notice would be appreciated. Mr. Tait reviewed the what if scenarios, as requested by Ms. Jacob. Mr. Tait talked about what if scenario estimated intergovernmental revenues fall short after the budget has been approved by referendum and the what if scenario estimated intergovernmental revenues are greater after the budget has been approved by referendum. The whole point of this discussion is to be prepared with what if scenarios since the outcome of state's decisions will not be known until after the referendum. Mr. Chaudhary commented said that this works as long as we are able to fund the shortfall, referred to bond timing. Mr. Lundquist expressed concern over this resolution and sending a confusing message to the state and voters. Mr. Eide brought up the cap cut on motor vehicle tax, fund balance. RESOLUTION PASSES 9-3 (Opposed: Mr. Eide, Ms. DeStefano, Mr. Lundquist)

Budget Recommendations from Finance/Admin, Education and Municipal Operations Committees: (ATTACHMENT C)

MR. FILIATO MOVED THAT THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN BUDGET BE REDUCED BY \$133,030 IN THE PENSION FUND, \$63,630 IN THE MEDICAL SELF INSURANCE FUND, \$188,406 FROM THE DEBT SERVICE LINE ITEM, AND \$10,000 FROM THE OUTSIDE AGENCY EDMOND TOWN HALL FOR A TOTAL OF \$395,066. SECOND BY DAN WIEDEMANN. Mr. Filiato led the discussion regarding the pension fund reduction and medical self-insurance fund reduction. Mr. Eide questioned the risks involved. Mr. Ferguson commented on the backing off of prudent financial practices in recent years which may cause a need to reduce expenditures or increase revenues, possibly facing budget challenges for a few more years. MR. EIDE MOVED TO AMEND AND DIVIDE THE MOTION INTO TWO MOTIONS, ONE TO INCLUDE THE PENSION FUND AND MEDICAL SELF INSURANCE FUND, AND THE OTHER MOTION TO INCLUDE THE DEBT SERVICE LINE ITEM AND OUTSIDE AGENCY EDMOND TOWN HALL. SECOND BY MR. CHAUDHARY. ALL IN FAVOR. MR. FILIATO MOVED THAT THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN BUDGET BE REDUCED BY \$133,030 IN THE PENSION FUND AND \$63,630 IN THE MEDICAL SELF INSURANCE FUND FOR A TOTAL OF \$196,660. SECOND BY MR. LUNDQUIST. MOTION PASSES 10-2 (Opposed:

### Memo re Newtown state aid from the approved 2017-2018 state budget.

The State of Connecticut has an approved budget for fiscal 2018. We now have knowledge of the amount of state aid which will come through various state grants, including ECS and Excess Cost, as well as other grant programs. As promised during our budget deliberations in March/April of this year, once the amount of state aid is known, decisions made during the budget development process are to be reviewed and modified as needed. Please consider the following.

- The anticipated 'new' grant program for special ed which would have provided funds to Newtown BoE did not materialize. Spec Ed funding approach remains as was done in the past. The LC agreed to restore the \$1,032,000 to the BoE budget should there be no separate grant funding.
- 2) The LC developed a schedule of other areas for partial to whole restitution should the state budget provide more aid funds for Newtown than what was anticipated in the approved local budget (LC minutes April 5, 2017)\*.

The approved state budget provides for \$2,052,293 more in aid than what was anticipated in the local budget.

Local Budget state aid = \$5,555,045; CT State Budget aid for Newtown = \$7,445,694 \$2,052,293

The \$2,052,293 to be reduced by \$1,032,000 (BoE special ed) and \$447,572 (m.v. assessment cap) \$572,721 remains for action

Proposal: LC initiate a Special Appropriation request for \$1,032,000 for BoE special ed.

LC hold off on any further special appropriations from this aid until later in this fiscal year in order to provide flexibility in needing to address some unanticipated education expenses.

\* LC resolved schedule of areas for reinvestment includes pension (\$188,000), roads (\$250,000), and repairs/maintenance for school facilities (\$135,000). (Total = \$573,000)

### Town of Newtown Ban on Invasive Plants As Recommended and Amended by the Conservation Commission on 10/24/17

The Town of Newtown endorses the ban of all plants on the Connecticut Invasive Plant List on town-owned properties. The List includes both Invasive and Potentially Invasive Plants as determined by the Connecticut Invasive Plants Council in accordance with Connecticut General Statutes §22a-381a through §22a-381d. As this List is reviewed and revised annually by the CT Invasive Plants Council, any updates will be immediately incorporated into the Town of Newtown's Invasive Plant Ban. All town departments are directed to consult the List before considering any new plantings on town-owned land.\*

### What are invasive plants?

Invasive plants are defined as having:

- a high reproductive rate,
- the ability to establish new plants and grow rapidly under a wide variety of site conditions,
- the ability to disperse wide distances, often by the spreading of vegetative fragments as well as seeds,
- the lack of the natural controls on growth and reproduction that would be found where the invader is native.

### Why is a ban on all invasive and potentially invasive plants necessary?

Invasive plants are non-native plants that are disruptive in a way that causes environmental or economic harm, or harm to human health.

In minimally-managed areas, invasive plants crowd out native plants. The presence of invasive plants alters the way plants, animals, soil, and water interact within native ecosystems, often causing harm to other species in addition to the plants that have been crowded out.

Invasive plants deny food and shelter to native insects, pollinators, birds and wildlife which have a symbiotic relationship with native plants developed over centuries.

Invasive, non-native species are considered one of the greatest threats to our environment. The damage they have already caused to natural ecosystems and the economy has cost governments, private land trusts, and landowners billions of dollars each year. Reducing their presence on all town properties is just one step in the larger effort to reversing this very critical and costly problem.

Some nurseries and garden centers in Connecticut continue to sell cultivars of potentially invasive plants. In addition, banned and potentially invasive plants can be purchased from out of state nurseries.

In May 2004, Public Act 04-203 restricted a subset of the January 2004 list making it illegal to move, sell, purchase, transplant, cultivate or distribute prohibited plants. Effective July 1, 2009, Public Act 09-52 removed the prohibition on Pistia stratiotes.

Dear Mr. Via:

It is my understanding that *Newtown Babe Ruth League, Inc.* (NBRL) has requested permission to utilize a utility vehicle at the baseball fields located on the Fairfield Hills campus.

If I understand correctly, the purpose of the vehicle is to transport supplies from a storage shed to the various fields and to groom the clay portions of fields in accordance with approved Newtown Parks and Recreation procedures. The vehicle will be used to groom fields on weekends. The vehicle will not be driven on roads or trails, pursuant to Town Ordinance. Said vehicle will be purchased and owned by NBRL and the League will be responsible for the proper oversight, maintenance and security of the vehicle. Accordingly, NBRL accepts responsibility for any liability resulting from injury or damage associated with the storage and operation of said vehicle.

The vehicle will be stored in a secure (i.e., locked) shed located near the *Glander Field Complex*. Prior to operation, each individual will sign an acknowledgement form (copy of form attached) indicating that he/she has been properly trained in the operation of said utility vehicle, instructed on the proper method of grooming fields and is familiar with the restrictions associated with the use of said vehicle. The acting President of Newtown Babe Ruth League, Inc. will also sign the form, acknowledge that he/she has read and understands the conditions of use and has approved each of the designated individuals to operate the vehicle. Upon the delivery of the original form to the offices of Newtown Parks & Recreation, the newly designated operators will be permitted to use the vehicle.

In accordance with the conditions and restrictions detailed above, I approve the use of said utility vehicle.
