Also Present: First Selectman Daniel Rosenthal, Christal Preszler, Wes Thompson, Helen Brickfield, Nancy Crevier and members of the Legislative Council Judit DeStefano, Jay Mattegat, Jordana Bloom.

First Selectman Rosenthal called the meeting to order at 1:34 p.m.

Acceptance of Minutes: Sue Shortt moved to accept the meeting minutes of October 22, 2018. Dan Sorrentino seconded. All in favor.

Plastic Bag Ban: This is still in the Ordinance Committee working phase. Judit DeStefano explained that existing bans have been used to inform the Legislative Council Ordinance Committee. The ban is for plastic bags at point of sale check out and allows for the sale of paper bags or re-useable bags. Stores would be mandated to charge 10 cents to consumers for paper bags. There would be a six month implementation and stores could apply for an extension. There has been community outreach and education. Dan Sorrentino is in favor of the plastic bag ban but would rather bear the 10 cent cost than to pass it on to his customers. He feels the mandated fee rubs business owners the wrong way. Judit DeStefano said that the ordinance mandates the charge and the idea is for consumers to use reusable bags. There may be resources for people who find the fee a hardship. Jordana Bloom said the best way to avoid paying the fee is to encourage people to use reusable bags right away. Gift type bags will be exempt. Jay Mattegat, speaking as a business owner and not as a member of the Legislative Council personally feels that the Council does not belong in the business of businesses. He thinks the ban is an unreasonable request to put on business owners and fears people will shop in other towns. Judit DeStefano stated that the research shows there is not a discernable negative impact on business owners and people get used to it. First Selectman Rosenthal wants to give the business community a voice in this initiative and thinks this is an opportunity to work with the business community. Chris Hottois thinks, although admirable, this will be a big undertaking, with rules, implementation and administration costs. He asked about restaurants and dentist offices, will they be required to charge customers and patients for bags? Helen Brickfield offered to share a survey with her Chamber mailing list; she believes rewarding businesses is best way to go. There was discussion on limiting the ban to high usage stores, such as grocery stores. Wes Thompson thinks the Legislative Council has to decide if it will be all or none and doesn't think it should be limited to only grocery stores. Erica Sullivan doesn't feel right about charging her customers for bags. Nancy Crevier offered the Bee as a resource to help educate the public. Christal Preszler said consumer behavior has to change and would encourage grocery stores to incentivize. First Selectman Rosenthal believes a collaborative effort with the business community will send a nice message about Newtown. This item will be carried to the next meeting.


