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

Monthly park update and field report

We have been repairing some recent vandalism, replacing signs and starting large brush/invasive removal projects. The annual holiday display has been removed for the season and the delayed luminary night went well and as did the clean up.

Winter equipment refurbishing is ongoing as well. We complete all required preventative maintenance as well as tackle and larger repairs/refurbishment that was put off during the season. The big trees that fell on Al's Trail this fall were cut up and removed.

Our annual reporting to the State for water and pesticide use has been completed and submitted.

<u>Dickinson Park:</u> Bathroom vandalism has been repaired here. Door deadbolts were added and the damaged partitions were repaired.

Newtown Middle School: No new news here.

Orchard Hill: Storm damage that we had only moved from the trails from the summer and fall has been cleaned up. The crew is now working on invasive removal from the meadow areas here.

<u>Lake Lillinonah:</u> The seawall here will be repaired once some other projects have been completed.

Oakview: No new news here.

Tilson Field: No new news here.

Treadwell Soccer/Softball: No new news here.

Glander Fields: We need to discuss dugout repair plan.

Liberty Fields: No new news here.

Walnut Tree: No new news here.

<u>Fairfield Hills</u>: Worked with Public Works to mark out parking and clean up around Kent House for the laser light event. Leaf and brush clean up was completed. Meadow mowing has started and will be ongoing during the winter when weather allows.

Topsoil and debris was removed from Newsylum construction. Vacant building stairwells were filled in in cooperation with public works.

We made a new "Covid" template which we mark on the walking trail when needed, weather permitting.

NHS Fields: All goals were removed and locked off of the fields.

Sandy Hook School: No new news here.

Hawley School Fields: No new news here.

Eichlers Cove Marina: All is quiet.

Dog Park: No new news here.

<u>Treadwell Park:</u> The walls in camp building have been patched. Guys are prepping floors and walls for paint. Some minor plumbing repairs are being done in the bathroom as well.

<u>Pole Bridge Preserve:</u> No new news here. Guys will be doing clean up here after Orchard Hill is complete.
